It is customery in these pages to discuss some problems facing the medical profession in general and Dow Graduates in particular and I would like to avail this opportunity to bring forward some of these problems.

There is a ban on foreign travel for doctors except for a limited period and that also on furnishing a large financial guarantee. It also involves getting a N.O.C. from the government and in the last couple of years hardly a few docrors have been allowed to go out of the country for higher studies. I fail to understand as to why only doctors have been singled out for this harsh treatment. Are the engineers scientists and teachers not as important. Moreover if the doctors are really needed at home why are they being "exported" to friendly countries through official channels. Besides, as long as adequate higher education facilities are not available within the country we should allow and encourage more and more of our young men to go abroad and bring fresh scientific medical knowledge back to the country. Surely some of these boys never come back but, there they do some useful work. So these non returners provide not only a smile of foreign exchange but promote goodwill for the parent country.

Another issue of grave importance is the large scale marketing of spurious drugs by unscruplous groups. Some form of severe action is required to stop this unwholesome business. These drugs are not only dangerous for health of the sick but are also incurring ill will of the public towards the family physicians. The doctor patient relationship will deteriorate further as the blame falls on the doctor for prescribing "useless" medicine. I think all drugs must be checked and certified by an independent national laboratory before they are put on the market for general usage. To face this menace the government profession and pharmaceutical industry must put up a united effort.

I think this is an appropriate forum to extend congratulations to the government for setting up three new medical colleges in the province. In the initial 25 years only one college was set up in Hyderabad whereas the present government is instrumental in setting up three new institutions in a short span of two years. However, I hope, the new institutions are provided with adequate equipment for their laboratories and enough staff for teaching purposes. There is an acute shortage of teaching staff in the older institutions and I hope the new colleges can get staff. In medical schools the ratio of teacher: student is of paramount importance. In medicine it is the quality and never quantity which counts and I hope we do not lose sight of this principle. There is no short cut to this and quality above every other consideration must be maintained.

In the end, I would like to express my sincere thanks to all and particularly, Dr. Manzoor Zaidi, and Dr. Badar Siddiqui for their help in arranging this function and Dr. Sabiha Mirza for the help in bring out this Souvenir.

I would also like to thank the pharmaceutical industry for generously advertising in our Souvenir.

In these days of specialisation it is surprising that there is no guide available on how to be a Dr's wife, I am convinced that this is a field which requires urgent and careful research.




