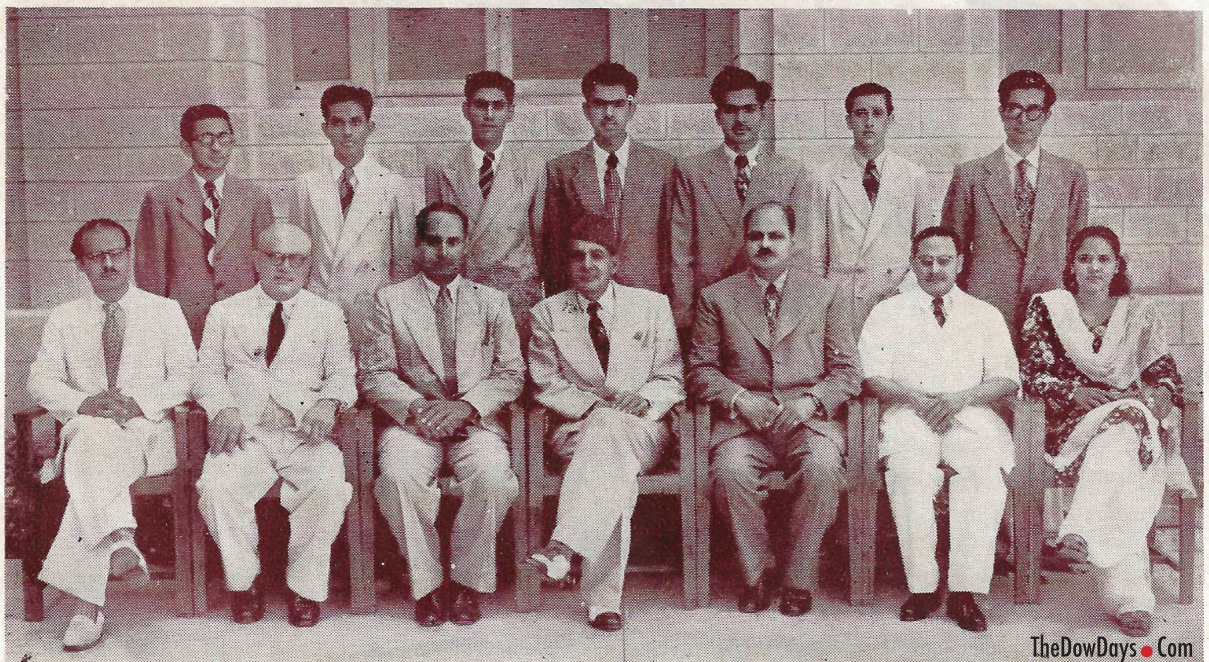

Governance of Students' Union Governance and Functioning Before the DMCSU Constitution

Based on the records, in the beginning, the structure of DMCSU was characterized by limited student governance. During this early period (1945 to 1950), even the position of vice president was occupied by faculty members rather than students.

It was only starting from this year, 1951-1952 that we observe the vice presidency being held by a student for the first time.

This change likely reflects the beginning of a gradual shift towards greater student autonomy, with elections being conducted to fill various positions. As evidenced in the subsequent reports from the general secretary, there is detailed information regarding the elections of the students' union during this period.

Despite these developments, the presidency continued to be held by the college principal, following the tradition of previous years. The process of granting full autonomy to the students unfolded gradually over time, marked by incremental changes rather than immediate transformation.

During the academic year of 1951-1952, Asif Jafferey served as the Vice President of the Dow Medical College Students' Union, a leadership position that reflected his active involvement in student governance and organizational affairs.

The 1952 Dow Medical College Magazine portrays him as a highly active, supportive, and prominent student leader who played a central role in both the administrative and extracurricular life of the college.

Inauguration and the Swearing-in Ceremony

Following the college elections held on December 8, 1951, Asif Jafferey and his cabinet were officially inaugurated during a swearing-in ceremony on the evening of December 22, 1951. The oath was administered by the esteemed Col. Jlal M. Shah. As part of the ceremony, Vice President Jafferey delivered a speech to the gathered students and staff. A significant highlight of this event was the unveiling of a large portrait of the late Prime Minister, Quaid-e-Millat Liaquat Ali Khan. This portrait was personally presented to the Union by Jafferey, a gesture that was formally acknowledged with gratitude by the General Secretary, Vajid Hasn Ali, in his annual report.

Sponsoring New Games:

When indoor games like Chess and Carrom were introduced to the college for the very first time that year, Jafferey personally presented a “beautiful shield” for the chess championship

Annual Sports Day:

During the highly successful College Sports event held on January 26 and 27, 1952, Jafferey was instrumental in helping the Gymkhana committee produce a commemorative souvenir. Gymkhana Secretary Nizam-ul-Hasan explicitly thanked Jafferey for his “help and suggestions” regarding the publication

Awarding Prizes:

He took part in presiding over specific athletic events, such as giving away the prizes for a “grim battle” of a mixed Volley Ball match held between the 4th and 5th-year students. At the conclusion of the Gymkhana Report, the Secretary offered a special note of thanks to Vice President Jafferey for his “whole hearted support” in helping him discharge his duties

International Representation and Goodwill Jafferey also acted as a representative of the student body’s international solidarity. On May 14, 1952, a twelve-man delegation from the Pakistan Medical Association (P.M.A.), led by Col. Jelal M. Shah, departed for a trip to Russia. Before the delegation left behind the “Iron Curtain,” Vice President Jafferey officially handed over a “message of goodwill for the Soviet medical students” to Col. Shah on behalf of the Dow Medical College student body. (More on this in the next pages)

Photographic Record Jafferey’s prominent status is cemented in the photographic record of the 1952 magazine. He is featured in the official Union cabinet photograph titled “Our College Union with the Health Minister on Sport’s Day” In this image, he is seated in the front row, positioned directly beside the Honorable Dr. A. M. Malik (Minister of Health). He also appears in a secondary photograph on the same page, pictured alongside Col. Jelal M. Shah, Prof. A. Wahid, and General Secretary Vajid.

The Student Diplomacy and International Goodwill: A Report on DMCSU Vice President Asif H. Jafferey (1951–1952)

Introduction

During the 1951–1952 academic session, the Dow Medical College Students' Union (DMCSU) operated in a dynamic environment, balancing intense domestic struggles for degree recognition with an increasingly outward-looking global perspective. As the Vice President of the Union, Asif H. Jafferey served not only as a domestic student leader but also as a representative of the student body's international solidarity. His tenure was marked by a distinct effort to foster goodwill and establish connections with the broader global medical fraternity.

Reaching Across the "Iron Curtain"

The most prominent example of Vice President Jafferey's role in international representation occurred in the spring of 1952. On May 14, 1952, a twelve-man delegation from the Pakistan Medical Association (P.M.A.) departed for a landmark trip to the Soviet Union. This delegation was highly significant for the college, as it was led by the esteemed Col. Jlal M. Shah and included three Dow professors: Dr. Munaver Ali, Dr. Shafiuddin, and Dr. Mazharul Haq.

Recognizing the diplomatic importance of this expedition behind the "Iron Curtain," Vice President Jafferey took the initiative to represent the student body on an international scale. Before the delegation's departure, Jafferey officially handed over a "message of goodwill for the Soviet medical students" to Col. Shah, the leader of the delegation. This gesture was a profound act of student diplomacy, demonstrating the DMCSU's desire to transcend Cold War geopolitical boundaries and build collegial, international ties with fellow medical students in the Soviet Union.

Hosting the Global Medical Community

Jafferey's diplomatic gesture to the Soviet students took place against a broader backdrop of intense international engagement at Dow Medical College. According to the General Secretary's Report, the 1951-1952 session saw a "stream of visitors from abroad, pouring into our college premises".

The Union, under the leadership of its cabinet which included Jafferey, played a role in welcoming these distinguished foreign guests. The college's main lecture hall transformed into an avenue where students and staff "drank deep at the fountain of our distinguished foreign guests". The student body and its leadership actively engaged with and expressed gratitude to numerous international luminaries, including:

Dr. Green Armytage and Dr. Gailey:

Visiting under the British Council lecture programme, these experts provided invaluable demonstrations and lectures on gynaecology and anaesthesia.

Dr. Ulysses Grant Dailey:

A distinguished surgeon from the United States, who not only lectured on cancer and its treatments but also took regular surgery classes for the students during his stay in Karachi.

Dr. Paul D. White:

A renowned cardiologist from the U.S.A., who gave lectures on coronary diseases and made a "generous gift towards the advancement of medical research in our country".

Professor Charles Reid:

A Scottish physiologist and former professor in Cairo, who joined the college staff under the World Health Organization (WHO) programme.

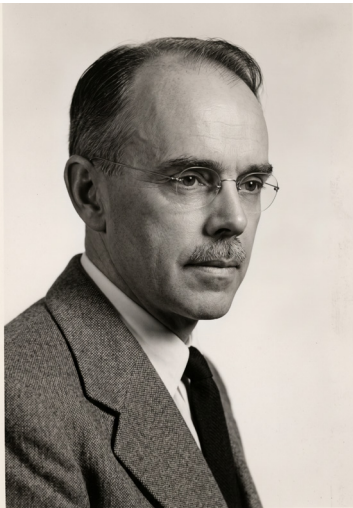
Conclusion

The earliest known report of the Dow Medical College Students' Union (DMCSU) appears in the April 1952 issue of the Annual Dow Magazine. I find that producing a notably detailed publication is a remarkable feat, as it provides important insights into student life in the early days and underscores the crucial role the student union occupied during that period. As the magazine's Secretary and Editor, Azmatullah Khan played a pivotal role in its publication.

The 1952 edition of the Dow Medical College Magazine stands as an invaluable archival treasure that captures the foundational years of the institution. Now 74 years old, this 134-page volume is recognized as the oldest known surviving full copy of the publication preserved in its entirety, making it the oldest known complete copy of Dow magazine available today.

Remarkably for its time, the publication was printed with color elements, featuring a blue-inked cover and striking red-tinted photographic spreads that immortalized student life, dramatic performances, faculty members, and campus events. As the "Third Number" of the magazine—published in April 1952 during the college's seventh year of existence and the fifth year of Pakistan's independence—it serves as a crucial historical record.

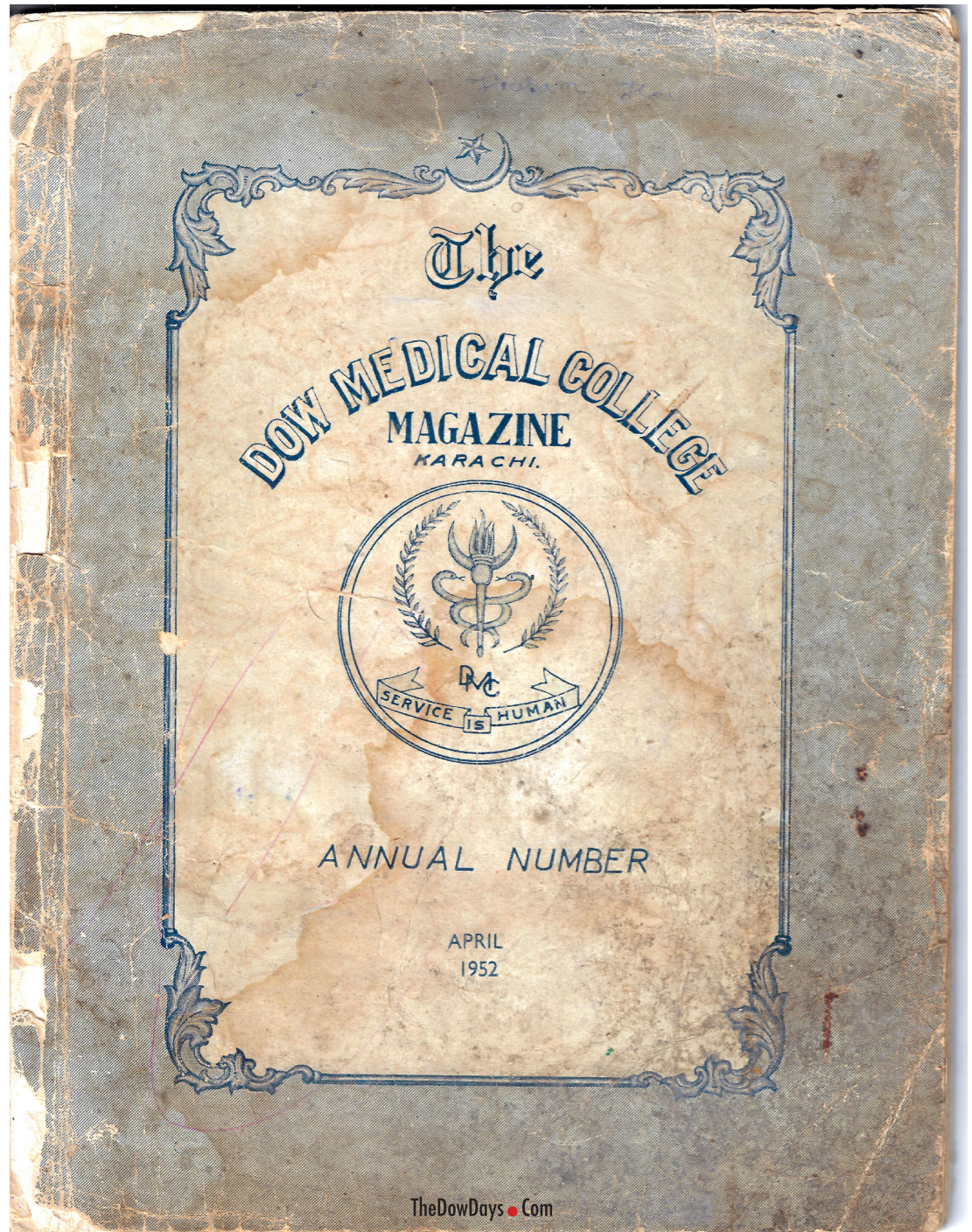

The archival treasure of Dow Medical College refers to the 1952 edition of the Dow Medical College Magazine (Number III; published in April 1952). As a 74-year-old, 134-page document, it is the oldest known surviving full copy of the college's publication preserved in its entirety.

This magazine serves as a vital historical time capsule for the institution, capturing a period when the college was in its seventh year of existence and Pakistan was in its fifth year of independence. Here are the key elements that make this document an invaluable archival treasure:

Visual and Photographic History For its era, the publication is remarkably visually rich. It features a blue-inked cover bearing the college crest and motto "Service is Human". Inside, it utilizes red-tinted photographic plates, such as a scenic shot of "Sunset at Sandspit" and an artistic landscape on the title page. More importantly, it contains extensive photographic records of the pioneer generation, including:

Campus Life: Images of the main college building, hostels, the Outpatient Department, and the Maternity & Gynaecology wards at Jinnah Central Hospital.

Student Activities: Photographs of the students visiting the mental hospital in Hyderabad ("Medicos in Mad House"), the college picnic at Sandspit, and the Drama Team, who were the proud winners of the 1951-52 Katrak Trophy.

Leadership and Dignitaries: Group portraits of the College Staff, the Jinnah Central Hospital Staff, and the College Union posing with notable figures like the Health Minister and H.E. The Governor-General of Pakistan.

Documentation of Student Activism and Governance:

The magazine provides a primary account of the passionate political consciousness of the student body. The "News and Trends" section meticulously records a 14-day college strike initiated in September 1951, where students united to protest the termination of house surgeons and demand official government recognition for their medical degrees. It also serves as the official record for the Students' Union (DMCSU), detailing the highly organized democratic elections, the swearing-in ceremony administered by Col. Jelal M. Shah, and the active leadership of students like Vice President Asif H. Jafferey and General Secretary Vajid Hasn Ali.

The magazine's table of contents reveals a robust academic environment, showcasing 35 distinct articles, reports, and editorials. It features contributions from both renowned professors and students, offering a window into the medical science of the 1950s. Notable entries include:

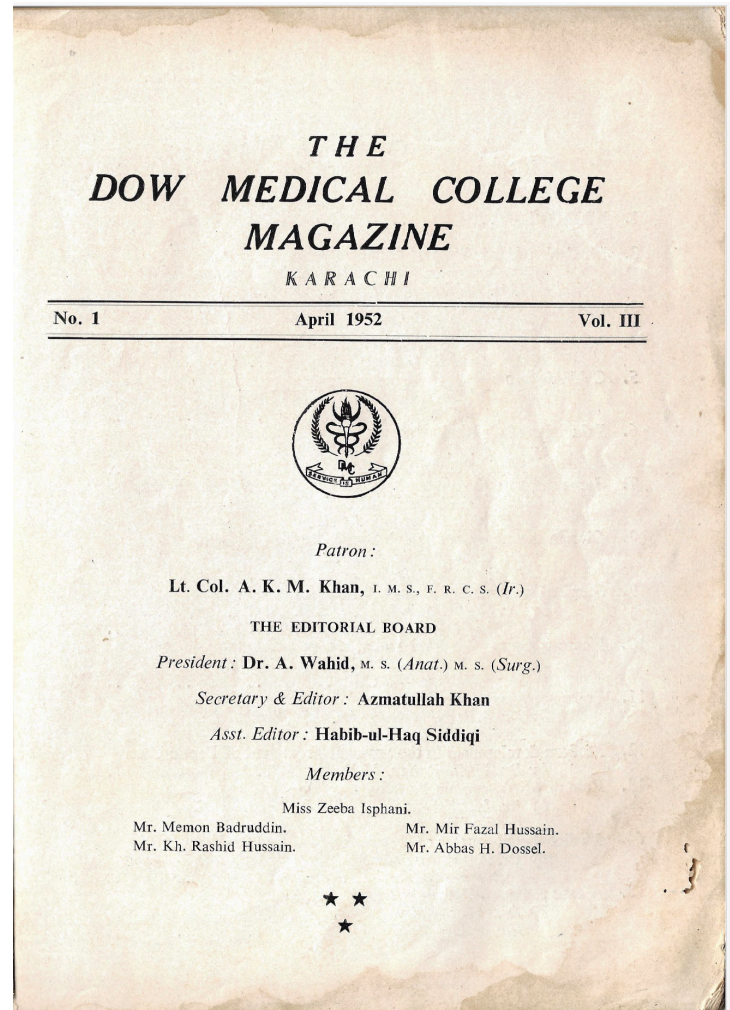
- + A piece on the "Circulatory changes in High Speed Flight" by Dr. Charles Reid, exploring aviation medicine.
- + Clinical discussions such as the "Surgical Treatment of Cancer Nose and Plastic Repair" by Dr. Shafi-Uddin Khan, and modern developments in treating Peptic Ulcers by visiting American surgeon Dr. Ulysses Grant Dailey.

- + Student-contributed research and essays on topics ranging from the "Causes of Failure in Examinations" to local public health crises like "Tuberculosis in Karachi".

International Connections

The document highlights Dow Medical College's active engagement with the global medical community during the early Cold War era. It records the visits and lectures of numerous international medical luminaries from the US and UK, and details acts of student diplomacy, such as the DMCSU sending a formal message of goodwill to Soviet medical students via a Pakistan Medical Association delegation traveling behind the "Iron Curtain".

Ultimately, from its somber "In Memoriam" dedication to the assassinated Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan to its lively accounts of student sports and fancy-dress competitions, this 1952 magazine encapsulates the spirit, struggles, and triumphs of the foundational years of Dow Medical College.

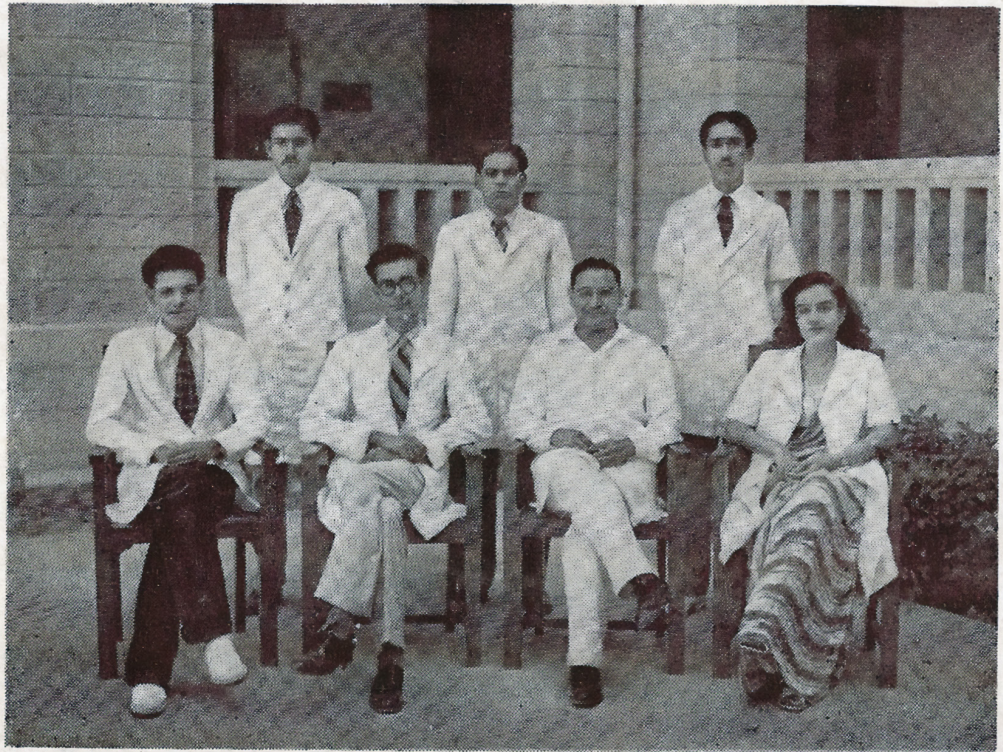

Editorial

"Courage, confidence and selfless sacrifice is needed for serving the suffering humanity."

THE aim in bringing out the annual number of the College Magazine regularly had been to evoke interest and to encourage the young brains of the budding doctors, together with giving vent to the voice of the students of this College, and thus to contribute towards the practice and advancement of the medical science in our country. It had been our endeavour to provide articles of high standard which not only may benefit the students but also fulfill the great need of our profession to a certain extent.

Third Number

The third issue of our magazine comes out as we enter the seventh year of the existence of our College and the fifth year of the achievement of freedom. It comes out when a heavy pail of international tension hangs over us. A tension that threatens every person on earth.

This year has been momentous in the development of Pakistan and our College being the only medical institution in the Federal Capital, has seen important changes in its own precincts. Besides making a good alround improvement, our talented students have been much handicapped by the lack of many necessary facilities in the academic and extra-curricular spheres. Since a long time we have been clamouring for recognition and patiently living on the hopes and the tantalizing promises made by the Government, as regards the improvement of our institution. But so far only clinical facilities have been arranged in the Jinnah Central Hospital.

The J. C. H.

Indeed it was a most welcome move taken by the Government. It has relieved the over-congestion in our hospital and given the opportunity of greater work and training

under an equally well qualified and painstaking staff of the Jinnah Central Hospital. We consider it to be a great step forward towards the recognition of our institution. The facilities in our hospital are quite insufficient for training about three hundred clinical students. As such we shall pray the University authorities to affiliate the J. C. H. to our institution, without any further hesitation.

43 Laes

We are much grateful to the Government for the amount of 43.13 laes, allocated towards the development and improvement of our institution. It is a handsome amount indeed, provided it is spent in the most proper and scrupulous manner.

We shall propose that a Planning Committee consisting of a few experienced members of the Pakistan Medical Council and other medical experts, should be set up immediately. It will be of immense help in the implementation of the recommendations of the Pakistan Medical Council and that of the Development Officer, to their satisfaction and the requirements of the British Medical Council.

But it is unfortunate that there is very insufficient space, at our disposal for expansion unless the Government requisitions the premises of the Khaliqdina Hall, the Civil Defence Training Centre and the Sind Hospital. Our requirements are many and varied and have been oft-repeated, and presented to the Government. Our immediate requirement is that of a residential hostel accommodation in the hospital premises.

We earnestly pray the Government to implement the recommendations of Col. Jelal M. Shah, the Development Officer, as soon

as possible. We are confident and hopeful from, what we have been told by the authorities that in very near future this institution will be made worth its place in the Federal Capital of Pakistan.

College Recognition

The issue is uppermost in the minds of the students and their parents. The fate of hundreds of the students hangs in balance. There is a great bewilderment amongst the newly qualified students, who find themselves helplessly stranded. Even the Sind Medical Council (the only one, so far recognizing our degree) has ceased giving recognition and registering our graduates. It is an irony of fate that after having studied hard for five long years, we are considered nothing more than quacks. Most humiliating indeed! We the students can in no way be blamed for any shortcomings of the institution. What will happen to those graduates who are turning out continuously? It is a shattering commentary indeed, that at the moment when there is a dire need for doctors in our country, the circumstances are such that the young and brilliant talents are rusting and our country is being helplessly impoverished.

We, therefore, implore the Government to give our problem the top priority. A batch of inspectors should be sent to our College and the formalities preceding recognition completed in as short a time as possible. We should be given due recognition, the equitable status and employment, as early as possible and thus provided an opportunity to serve the disease stricken masses of our country, with all devotion and enthusiasm.

We are confident that our graduates are in no respect inferior to the graduates of other places and that we are destined to play a brilliant and decisive role in the progress of health and medicine in Pakistan.

We deem ourselves fortunate to have Hon'ble Dr. A. M. Mailk as our Minister of Health, who belongs to our fraternity. Our hopes of early recognition and improvement of our institution are pinned to his noble and trusted personage. We strongly believe, and once again appeal to him to take personal interest in the amelioration of our miserable lot, as promised by him.

House jobs

We need not stress upon the necessity of providing paid house jobs to every passed out student and the importance of compulsory internship, for at least one year, if the Government sincerely desires that the young doctors should prove an asset to the state and the profession.

We consider that a minimum of Rs. 200 should be paid to the Housemen as is prevalent in certain other institutions here, as well as elsewhere in Pakistan, in view of the soaring prices and a high standard of living in the metropolis. We trust and pray the Government to allay the existing discontentment without delay.

Conscriptions

We as budding doctors view the Act with some concern, even though we are not governed by it until we are recognised. Though enacted with good intentions, it has failed to bring about the desired results because of many drawbacks, particularly the incredibly low pay and the lack of facilities provided therein. Recently Hon'ble Dr. Malik promised in the Parliament that every where graduates will be paid Rs. 250 basic, but so far it is the case only in Punjab. We request the Government to keep in mind that "Nothing is more dangerous than a poor doctor" (G. B. Shaw), and to kindly keep the most valuable men of public service above the financial stringency, by providing them with nothing less than the Class II Service everywhere.

We again appeal to the Government to reconsider the Act, in the background of nearly two years experience and, make the necessary amendments, as proposed by the Pakistan Medical Association, as early as possible, in order to make it serve the necessary and useful purpose.

Medical Education

The medical education in our country could not so far survive the shock after partition, due to the lack of qualified teachers and equipment etc. together with the failure on the part of the Government to provide

the necessary facilities and encouragement to the available few. We pray our Government to make sincere efforts towards improving our sad lot by encouraging the national talents, and providing them more facilities while the foreign talents, should also, be imported freely wherever required without hesitation.

Again the medical education should be standardized in our country, so that graduates of the same standard and efficiency may come out of all the institutions.

As regards the post graduate research work, we feel that it is really pre-mature to venture any comprehensive suggestions till such time as our basic medical degree is standardized and recognised.

Karachi 'Varsity

We welcome the Federal 'Varsity and trust that it will pay the necessary attention towards our difficulties and allay the situation. For example our college fees are very high and it is becoming impossible for the middle class people—the backbone of society, to cope with it. We therefore request them to bring down our college fees by half its amount as early as possible.

Another important and necessary work for the 'Varsity is to compile our College curriculum without any further delay.

Again, in order to encourage the students, the 'Varsity should award merit scholarships and the certificate to the first four position holders of our College in every Class, and also extend monetary help to a large section of the needy students in the form of scholarships, stipends and loans.

National Health

Health is the basic problem and forms the foundation of a nation's edifice. But it is distressing to note the deteriorating health conditions here, which can be assessed by the alarming spread of tuberculosis and other disease in our country. More than 40 lacs of the population of Pakistan is involved in tuberculosis as revealed by the W. H. O. recently.

The factors contributing to the spread of tuberculosis are many and varied, mostly all

those which may lower the resistance of an individual. However the B. C. G., vaccination and mass radiological examination is being done, but it is not going to check or oust this micro-monster from here, unless we make joint efforts on the economic, social, educational and medical fronts all at the same time. No wonder drug or hospitalisation is going to bring about any fruitful results. The scourge of this disease in the present stage, is sufficient to wake up our political and social leaders to make frantic efforts rather wage a battle to overcome this malady, in close cooperation with the medical profession. The nation is allowed to be sapped and robbed of its numerous intelligent and patriotic citizens most recklessly.

Well organised and energetic efforts should be made by the Government to provide housing accommodation with adequate water supply and open spaces, recreation grounds and parks, employment and unadulterated food stuffs specially the milk and its product, together with the proper education on health and sanitation to the public.

For all this we need a planned economy, social sense and order and a complete reorientation in our conception and out-look on health as defined by the W. H. O. "A state of complete physical, mental and social well being". More attention should be paid towards the prevention of ill-health, by checking the factor responsible for disease and distress.

The state of medical neglect, due to the lack of hospitals and dispensaries, in Karachi, with a population of 13 lacks is appalling. More hospitals, dispensaries, maternity and child welfare centres are needed, in order to extend the necessary medical aid to the needy population.

It is unfortunate that there is no proper attention paid to the maintainance of statistic of death, disease and birth in our country. The same state prevails in the hospitals of Karachi, which fail to produce authentic figures about the number of cases treated for a particular ailment.

Student Health

It is simply disheartening to note the state of health of the students of Karachi.

The total absence of medical attention is deplorable. It is an acknowledged and definite responsibility of the University to fulfill its duty, towards the neglected but promising youth of the country.

Even, we the medical students of the College can justly complain of the lack of attention and care. The alarming increase of tuberculosis in Karachi, necessitates the College authorities to be strict in making a thorough check up, at the time of taking admissions, to eliminate the doubtful cases. The College students should be compulsorily examined physically and radiologically, half yearly without fail and the active or doubtful cases given the proper medical attention in time. Arrangements should be made in our College for the periodic check up and records kept here.

Again the state of the students' ward is very bad. It has an insufficient number of beds and is not well kept and maintained. Besides there are numerous other drawbacks. We once again request the authorities, as we have repeatedly done before, to kindly set things right without any further neglect.

Health Minister

The brief survey given here of the pathetic state of the public health medical education and administration in our country is enough to make one realize the great responsibility and importance of the Ministry of Health. We cannot afford to neglect and give the health of the nation, the secondary importance any more. As such we strongly believe that there should be a separate Minister of Health, in the interest of the progress and prosperity of Pakistan, as early as possible.

Medical Ethics

It is distressing to note the growing degeneration of medical ethics in our profession and we request the Pakistan Medical Council to take the necessary steps without any further delay.

Again our College authorities should pay the necessary attention towards the students in this respect. Periodic lectures should

be arranged for the first and third year students and talk given on the medical ethics, bed side manners and conduct. Disciplinary action should be taken against the violators without fear or favour.

Such steps are very necessary in order to maintain the nobility of the profession, its traditions and our sacred duty to maintain them at any cost.

Two Wings

East and West Pakistan although separated by a stretch of long distance are actually inseparable. Each is essential and vital for the progress and prosperity of Pakistan as a whole.

We strongly believe that the exchange of students and teachers on scholarship basis, can play a great part in fostering good will and further strengthening the ties between each other. In sports, debates and various other competitions, our East Pakistani brethren should be invited without fail. Frequently visits and lecture tours by eminent people in the field of science, medicine and arts should be sponsored by the respective institutions on reciprocal basis.

Besides the Government, by providing cheap travelling facilities and the business community of Pakistan by financing such enterprise, should encourage the move.

The Rich

The rapidly growing apathy and avarice in the rich and well to do class of people here is very disappointing and unknown to the democratic countries of the world. There can be found good number of philanthropists amongst the minorities of Pakistan but not so common in others. Such trends are not only dangerous to our young democratic state but quite contrary to Islam. Usually hospitals and educational institutions are run by this section of people in other countries, but it is difficult to find such public spirited people here.

We shall request the rich people, to kindly contribute towards the improvement of our

institution by donating large sums of money towards the construction and equipment of the necessary buildings, as well as in the form of scholarships to the needy students.

Being citizens of a free state, it is high time that they realize their moral and national obligations by mitigating the misery and poverty of their countrymen and thus fulfil their duty towards God and man. If persuasion fails to bring about the desired results, we shall advise the Government to act boldly and tax them suitably well and fulfil the requirements of the people.

Our Surgeons

We learn with gratification that there is a move to form the Association of Surgeons of Pakistan. We heartily congratulate the sponsors and consider it to be a step forward to improve the standard of surgical practice in our country. We pray that this may stimulate the physicians to organise themselves similarly.

Old Boys' Association

It is high time that the graduates of this College organise themselves, as early as possible. We shall strongly impress upon

them the necessity of forming an association, at the moment when they are considered not more than quacks. They should constitutionally fight for their legitimate rights and privileges and also help in furthering the interest of this institution.

We wish them all success in their undertakings and promise to extend our full cooperation and provide with the necessary space in our magazine, to report their activities.

Postscript

We are much grateful to all those who have contributed articles to this issue of our magazines. We shall fervently appeal to all the students to take a keen interest and more pains to contribute a good number of articles, so that we could bring out two magazines in a year.

Lastly we are much thankful to Lt.-Col. A. K. M. Khan, the Principal, Prof. A. Wahid, the President, Dr. M. Haq, the Ex-Officio and Dr. Zaidi, the Treasurer, for their ever ready help and guidance.

Once again I am greatly indebted to the members of the Editorial Board for their unremitting zeal, full cooperation and understanding.

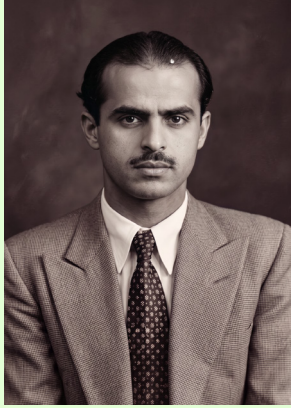

It is a very old story since the time our students have been requesting to recognise their college, but it is now full EIGHT MONTHS since the Government made full-throated promises to recognise the college and the degree, and in token of it the authorities appointed a development officer in the able person of Colonel Jalal M. Shah, in whose untiring efforts and endeavours great hopes have been attached. When approached personally, he had given a surmise that it would not be very long when the degrees would be recognised. It was then, that our disappointed students heaved a sigh of relief. But alas amidst our utter dismay and disappointment, we visualised, that a long period of EIGHT MONTHS could not prove sufficient for our authorities to enable us to see a ray of hope. The deligence, intelligence and perseverance of our students have been spoken of in high words by the examiners coming from Indian and Pakistan colleges. To this above fact no more reliable authority than the head of our Institution bears the testimony. If it was for the mere absence of Pathology and Hygenic Department that the Pakistan Medical Council deprived the students of recognition, then let the Council send its inspectors without any further

loss of time and see that these departments are as complete as any other department of the college. It is enough that the Pakistan Medical Council disappoint the students any more, while we pray them to take the college and hospital in the fold of their recognition, lest the Government might be forced to enact special law to recognise the medical college of the Federal Capital.

Any way our students are always optimistic and these disappointments will not make them budge an inch from their firm determination. We attach greater and stronger hopes to our college authorities and to the higher authorities concerned and that it will not be too long before we are fortunate enough of seeing this college no less reputed and efficient than any of the world colleges.

Library and Lunch Room

For the benefit of students the library was transferred to the first storey where much more silent and concentrated reading can be done than on the ground floor room, where the common room has been located. The professor's room on the ground floor was made available for the students as their lunch room. As requested by a majority of students the library timing were changed to, 12 noon to 6 p.m.

Memorandum to the Health Minister

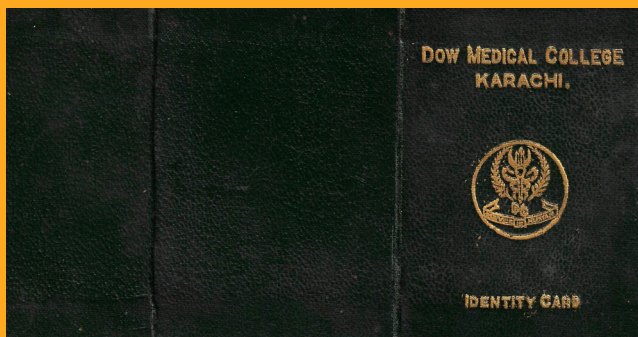

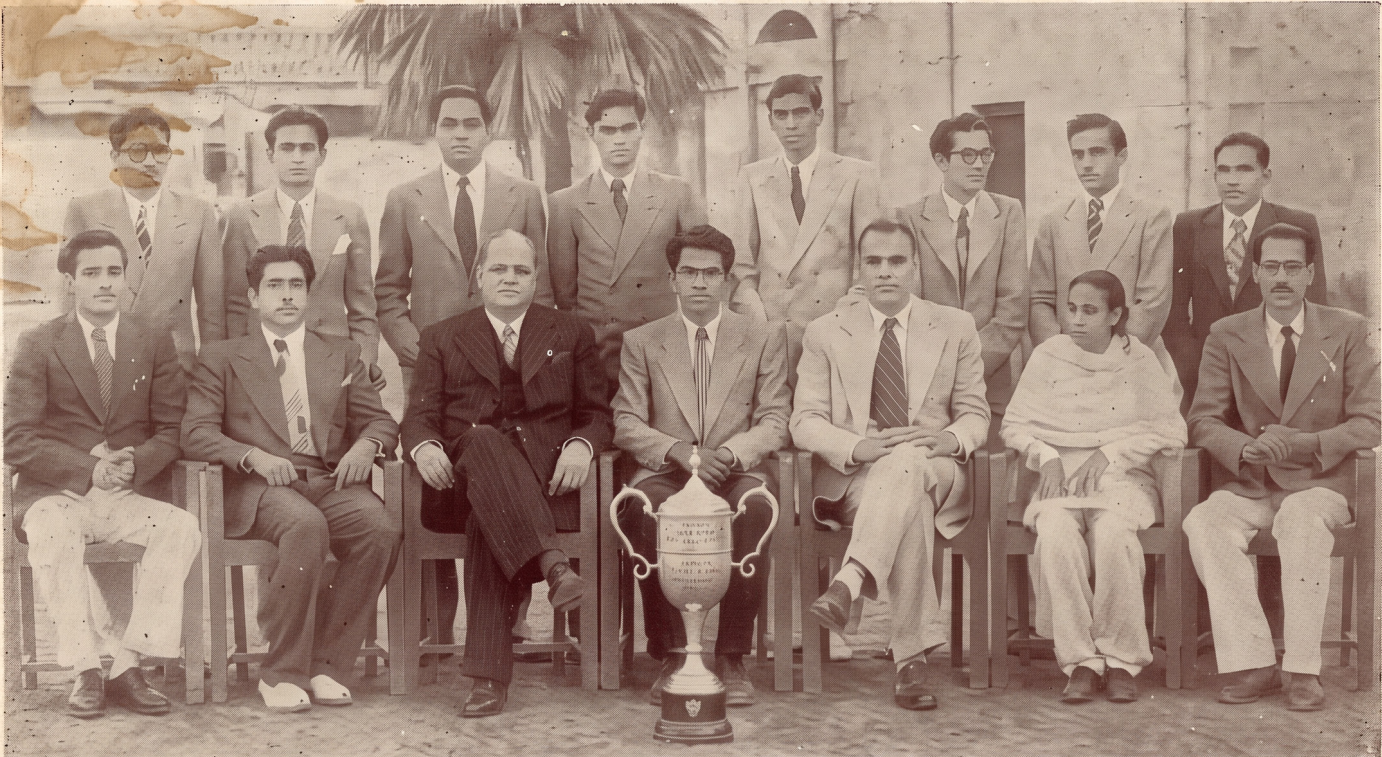

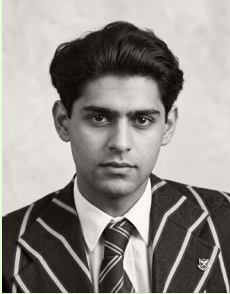

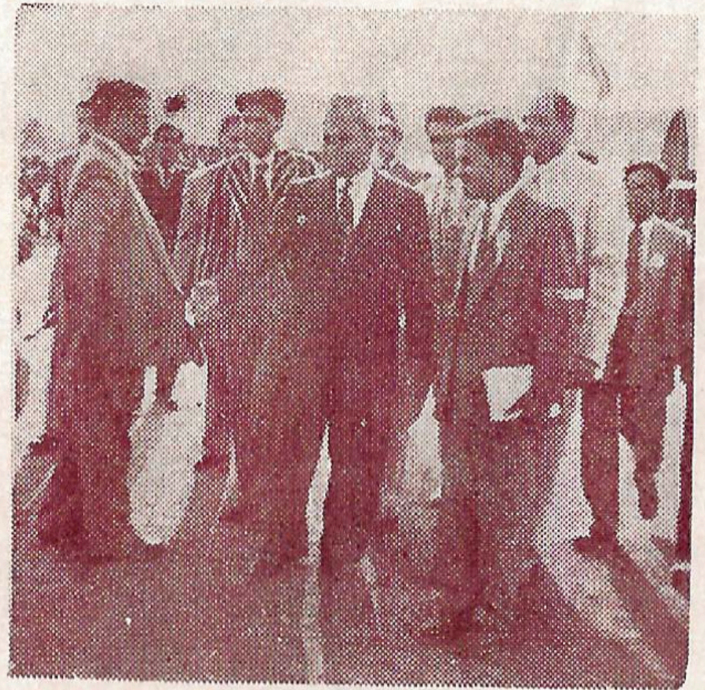
DMCSU - Annual Sports: 1951 - 1952

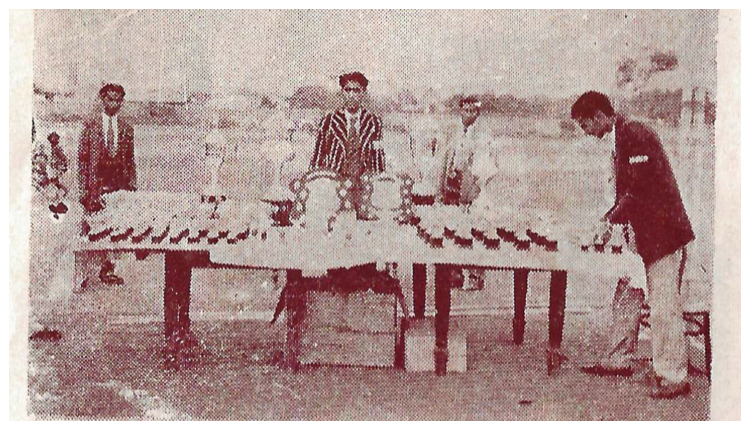

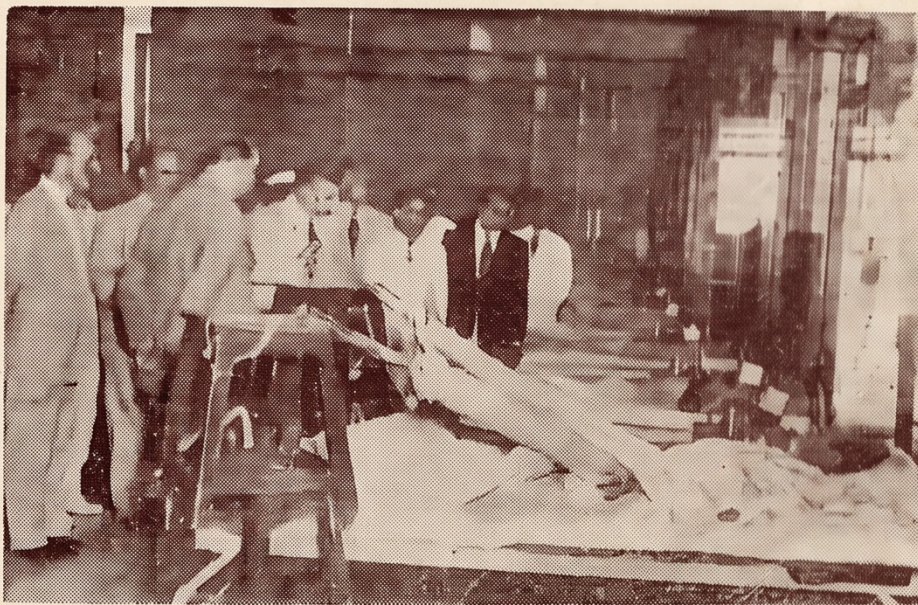
